We recently designated several of our fosters that came to rescue in 2021 as 'Forever Fosters'. That means that a dog has significant medical issues, advanced age, or behavioral issues that makes them difficult to adopt to a forever home. We are featuring these dogs in this newsletter so you can read their stories. A Forever Foster is treated just like any other dog in the home, and are loved as a member of the family. The difference is that Rescue will always oversee any care that the dog gets - and they get whatever they need. As you can imagine, the medical care can be expensive for these dogs. We follow the National Sheltie Rescue Association Code of Ethics which can be found at https:// nationalsheltierescueassociation.org/ethics.html. We are looking for sponsors for these dogs to help offset these costs. Please contact us if you would like to make a one-time, or monthly donation to support these dogs. SSPSNJ is not a shelter or kennel, all our dogs are kept in foster homes with families who will help determine what home is right for each dog. All our fosters undergo evaluation with veterinary check ups, being brought up to date on vaccinations, heartworm checked, dental evaluations and spayed or neutered if needed.

Our current foster, \mathcal{LWA} is available for adoption.



Luca is a 5 year old neutered male. He weighs about 25lbs. He can be a little shy when first meeting new people, but he does warm up especially if they offer him a treat. Luca is a very enthusiastic, happy dog who loves to go for walks, run around the yard, chase tennis balls, and play with his toys. He is a barker and will let you know if someone is at the door, or sometimes he just likes to bark to let you know he is happy.

Luca has impeccable manners in the home, is housebroken and is not destructive. He is crate trained but does not really need to be crated once he is comfortable in the home. Luca needs to go to a home with a fenced yard so he can run off some of his energy, and with a family who is willing to take him for 20 - 30 minute walks most days. He is a great walking buddy, is not reactive to cars, bicycles, joggers, or dogs barking behind a fence. He does not pull on a leash. He is a higher-energy dog and needs an outlet for all that energy to help him behave his best. Although Luca is okay around other dogs in a controlled situation (ie, all on leash), he really needs to be an only dog. He lived as an only dog most of his life so he does not have great doggie social skills. He plays very rough and does not 'hear' when the other dog tells him that they've had enough. This can and will lead to a dog fight as he will retaliate when another dog tells him off. He also does not like to share his toys or tennis balls with other dogs. So no exceptions to the 'no other dogs in the home' rule. He also is not a fan of children, so he will need to go to a home without young children. An older, dog savvy teen would likely be okay.







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SSPSNJ believes that there is a home for every dog we rescue and we are willing to wait to find it. However, every now and then certain dogs have ongoing medical expenses that make adoption more difficult. These dogs have a very special place in our hearts and still deserve a chance at happiness.

Merrill

Merrill came into NJ Sheltie Rescue's care in April 2021. He ended up in the shelter with his 2 friends when his owner was unexpectedly taken to the hospital by ambulance. These 3 dogs had led a very quiet life with their owner up until that day. They were terrified and confused and didn't understand what had happened to them. But through the persistence and perseverance of several volunteers, and with the blessing of the shelter, the rescue was able to get all 3 dogs out and into foster homes. We at NJ Sheltie Rescue will do everything in our power to help any sheltie that needs us.

Forever Fosters continued

Merrill is the oldest of the 3 dogs, at the age of 13. It took him a little bit of time to settle into his foster home, as is normal. He missed his old owner and was confused about his life being turned upside down. But he did settle in and he found his 'happy' once again. He is such a sweet boy and his foster family adores him.

He's had his share of health problems since he's come to rescue. Most recently, we discovered that he had a surgical repair of a back leg that involved pins and screws, and that the repair had failed. The plate and screws were migrating and starting to come through his skin. Not only is this painful, it also opens up the possibility of a systemic infection. So Merrill got the surgery that he needed to remove the broken hardware. He took the surgery in stride and is recovering well.



Merrill has a few other health issues that we are keeping a close eye on. Due to his age and these health issues, he was deemed a 'Forever Foster' with the rescue. That means he will live out his life as a much loved member of his foster family, and rescue will cover any medical expenses he may have.

She has arthritis and has been diagnosed with Cushing's Disease, both of which are being treated with medication and testing. Her medical treatments will continue so she is comfortable for her remaining years. Shelly has responded to her treatments so far and is in a forever foster home where she will be loved and cared for.



Shetland Sheepdog Placement Services of New Jersey (SSPSNJ) is a non-profit 501 (c) (3) organization managed by a group of very dedicated volunteers committed to the welfare of unwanted or unloved shelties.

Meeting Khaleesi (SSPSNJ Adoption Success Story)

Let me begin by saying that we had not had a dog in our home in a very long time. Both my husband and I traveled often for business so we didn't feel it would be fair to have a dog alone for long periods of time. When we both retired and had more time we decided the time was right for us. We had several



dogs while our children were younger and living at home including our Sheltie and Black Lab. I always knew I would want another Sheltie when we brought a new dog into our home. I just love the breed.

In February 2020, I started our search for our new pup. It was not an easy task. I searched every day, sometimes more than once, on several different rescue sites. Many other people were also looking



for a dog and any available seemed to go quickly. By around May I contacted the NJ Sheltie Rescue group. It was the best thing I ever did. After completing the application, interview process and waiting a few months, we were identified as being possible candidates to adopt Khaleesi. When we met her on Dec 5, 2020 at her foster home, it was 'love at first site'. I absolutely knew I wanted her to be our forever pup. She was exactly what I was searching for as we didn't want a puppy or a very active dog. You know as retired folks, life slows down a little bit!

The foster parents brought Khaleesi to us the following Saturday, Dec 11th. She found her way around the house and yard quite easily. Her first day here was good. She ate her food and drank her water with no issues. At night she knew right where her place would be. That's right, in the center of the bed.



Khaleesi has never used a crate nor has she ever chewed anything in the house that wasn't hers. We have been so fortunate to adopt such a well trained pup.

When Khaleesi first came to us she was very shy and seemed afraid of men and younger children. She did not hesitate to snarl at them and show her teeth to let them know their place in her house. It took several months to 'break' this habit with her but after she knew she was safe and how much we loved her, the snarling stopped.

Khaleesi's hair is different from other shelties. Instead of being straight, her hair is curly on the ends. One more reason I knew she was meant to be ours. I also have curly hair!





It was important for Khaleesi to like Jim, my husband. It took about a month for her to realize what a kind, soft-spoken man he is. If you saw the two of them together you would think she had been with us forever. She absolutely adores him and curls up to him whenever possible. She has this funny routine



of licking his hands all the time. Then it continues for her to chew his fingernails. You can actually hear her grinding her teeth against his fingernails. In addition to doing this anytime during the day, it is especially important for her to aet that time with him when she gets into the bed. There is no sleeping until she has five minutes on his hands and fingernails.

Khaleesi doesn't really play with toys. She is

content with 2 chew toys and my old slippers. That's fine with me as it gives me a good reason to buy new ones. Most of the day, unless she is following me around the house, she is content to sit and watch us from her favorite spot in the living room. Khaleesi is not fond of the car but has made a few trips with us and she is making progress. She will again be going on vacation with us for six weeks to Myrtle Beach in March.

We added a new deck to our home this year. Khaleesi immediately found her lookout spot at the top of the steps and she absolutely loves sitting there watching all



the neighbors go by. She really enjoys being outside and like most Shelties, enjoys the colder weather. It is sometimes hard to get her to come back in.

We were told that Khaleesi got her name from the 'Game of Thrones' TV show. (Her brother's name was Aegon). I searched the meaning of her name and it actually means 'Queen' and that is certainly fitting of this little girl. She has definitely become the Queen of our house!

Jim and I cannot thank the NJ Sheltie Rescue for allowing us to adopt Khaleesi. Thank you also for the tremendous support you provide to all the dogs you rescue and their adoptive families. You truly are a very special group of people.

Living With An Older Dog

Living with an older dog means feeling your heart speeding up every time you see them a little more still than usual and approaching with the fear that they have stopped breathing.

Living with an older dog means being aware that some of the things you'll do together may be the last.

Living with an older dog means thinking "this is their last summer", "this is their last July", "This could be the last morning".

Living with an older dog means they bark at any noise at any time, not because they know what they are barking at, its they feel they need to bark and let us know.

Living with an older dog means, you have to lift them up into the truck, the bed, the couch, the stairs.

Living with an older dog means putting off commitments because it's important to be close to them.

Living with an older dog means we trip over them

because they are so sound asleep they don't hear us approaching them.

Living with an older dog means accidents in the house, its ok they don't mean to do it.

Living with an older dog means feeling guilty because you know you could have done more, giving them more runs, more travel, more hugs, more caresses, more everything.



I would like to say that living with an older dog also puts us in the face of our own death, fragility, vulnerability.

Living with an older dog means we got to experience life with an older dog, which is one of the best joys on earth!



How important is proper nail care for your dog?

According to an AKC article (link provided below), a dog's nail consists of the living quick and the hard outer material called the shell. The quick supplies blood to the nail and runs through the core of it. Nerves in the quick cause bleeding and discomfort when cut. Regular nail trimming will cause the quick to recede from the end. Short quicks are the preferred length for the dog's well-being and easy maintenance.

Long nails can turn a sound paw into a splayed foot and reduce traction, and they can cause deformed feet and injure the tendons over an extended period. As the long nail hits the ground, the pressure puts force on the foot and leg structure.

Long nails can deform the foot of your dog and cause **serious injury** to the tendons within weeks




Examples of nails that are too long

Per **Donna Colletti of Pinnacle Shelties**, it is not only the strain on the tendons, but also changes that occur in the entire foot and upper arm. Rescue has had several "duck footed" shelties over the years due to changes in the foot from long nails. If the nails are long, they hit the ground before the pad, which causes the nail bed to be sore. The dog is supposed to touch the ground with the pad first.

Nails that are "over the pad" are too long. Chronic long nails can even start to slant, turn and bend when they get too long.

The quick must be exposed to dry and shrink back. Most vets and groomers trim a long nail and leave easily 1/4 inch from the quick – this nail will remain long.

Donna actually cuts nails at a slightly different angle (see diagram) so that the quick is sure to recede. There is a link below for a video showing how this is done.

Ways You Can Help Support NJ Sheltie Rescue!

Become a **FOSTER HOME**. While fostering, we get familiar with that Sheltie's personality and needs. Foster homes are an important part of our rescue since we do not operate a shelter. All our rescued Shelties go into a home environment for evaluation.

Do **HOME CHECKS** for prospective foster/adoptive homes. Home checks are used as an aid in ensuring that we are placing the right rescue in the right home.

Provide **TRANSPORTATION** for our shelties, whether it is picking them up from a shelter or home, taking the dog to a foster home or to the vet...we always need people to help with transportation needs.

SPONSOR a sheltie in a foster home to help with their needs.

General **VOLUNTEERS** are always welcome. We could always use volunteers to help with fundraising, the rescue picnic and holiday party along with spreading awareness of our rescue to the any one interested in helping Shelties.

DONATE to SSPSNJ. Donations are used to rehabilitate and support Shelties surrendered to us. All dogs are taken to a veterinarian for a complete physical, brought up to date on all shots, blood is checked for heartworm and tick-borne diseases, and spayed or neutered (if needed), a thorough dental if needed; older dogs have a senior panel to evaluate

kidney, liver and pancreatic organ function, as well as screen for diabetes and other metabolic disorders, CBC & differential checks for anemia, infection and immune system status. A thyroid panel is run on dogs showing signs of hypothyroidism.
